2019-20 Art Gallery Exhibition Schedule

<u>September 15 – November 8, 2019</u> Madeleine Söder *Meditations*

This body of work is about repetition, labor, and contemplation where the process itself is just as important as the finished work. Madeleine explores traditional fiber techniques, such as stitching, crocheting, weaving, netting, and papermaking, and uses them in contemporary ways. Each work in this show is a contemplative journey, exploring the internal landscape of the mind through meditation, and bringing them forth into a physical expression. Many works arose from deeply spiritual and existential inquiries, while others have strong social and political connotations.

Threads Allure: An Interactive Relationship Between Woven Fibers and Viewers

In the realm of weaving, the fusion of threads creates attractions either from the construct patterns, fiber selections, color combination, and/or techniques. A display of complex and beautiful seductions will be exhibited. The appeal will vary for each viewer as there are different makers.

This unprecedented and artful exhibit goes beyond the usual exposition boundaries. Viewers will be able to touch the creation itself or a sample of it. Viewers will encounter not only a visual sentiment but a unique and educational tactile experience.

Aljon Tacata and Sheanae Tam *now:*

now /nou/: at the present time or moment Now explores the interconnectedness of everything. Now binds the past and the future, and depicted the impermanence of life. <u>March 15 – April 24, 2020</u> Dannah Mari Hidalgo *Pending*

Pending is a contemporary exploration of working class emotions and situations, specifically of the millennial generation. It investigates the frustrations associated with the pressures of social expectations fabricated by family members, peers, and media upon graduating from Post Secondary institutions. Indoctrinated in unrealistic expectations, innumerable individuals feels as if backed into a corner by limited options, constantly subjecting ourselves to critiques of each other and ourselves.

<u>May 3 – June 26, 2020</u> 'Īmaikalani Kalāhele and Sean K. L. Browne, with haumana

'Elima (Five)

After a journey of over thirty years of teaching and mentoring the next generation of artists, 'Īmaikalani Kalāhele and Sean K. L. Browne join with selected haumana (students) Cory Kamehanaokalā Holt Taum, David Kiyabu, and Kunāne Wooton, in an exhibition of their artwork. These five artists share their views of Hawaii's past, present, and future.

<u>July 5 – September 4, 2020</u> Candice Gima and Shingo Yamazaki

Who Are You

Who Are You, a two person show by Candice Gima and Shingo Yamazaki, examines our relationships with others beyond the mental and physical boundaries of our private and public lives.

Inspired by the iconic green hedges of many West LA homes, Gima explores the relationship we share with our neighbors, drawing on the intimacy that may or may not exist there. What or who lays beyond the security of that organic yet symbolic border?

Alternatively, Yamazaki pulls from experiences of his past having witnessed the gradual decline of his grandmother's memory to dementia. Through these paintings of family, objects, and experiences, he explores how physical actions leave remnants of one's existence and how this relates to what is remembered of us.
